It is important to note that the Karl Heusner Memorial Hospital is not included in this initiative as its needs will be evaluated separately; however, the government remains committed to ensuring quality healthcare access for all Belizeans.

Furthermore, this landmark decision sets an example for other nations and demonstrates Belize's dedication to fulfilling its social responsibility. Through this initiative, government expects to improve public health and enhance economic productivity.
